An Era to Remember: The Taylor Swift Movie




When she got home she walked over to her mom and hugged her. She told her mom that she didn't need the bike but her mom responded and said, "Well that's too bad because I bought you the bike."


Charlotte was so happy and she hugged her mom so tight and said that she was so happy and that she loved her.


That day she learned that the true meaning of Christmas is not getting gifts from Santa, but it's about spending time with family and being grateful for what you have.



Now I will talk about what I think makes this one of if not the best Mario game: the fast strats. If you're good at executing Mario's moves and using Cappy, you can skip huge portions of challenges, but I haven't even told you the best part about this. The developers intended for you to do this! In several places, you can find extra platforms or little details to help experienced players go through the game quicker. This is even incorporated into bosses; nearly every boss has some way to hit its weak point faster or skip cycles. For example, in the battle with Bowser, you need to grab his hat, which you can use to punch him, and then avoid a bunch of fireballs and bombs, but if you're quick with grabbing the hat and getting close to him, you can hit him before he starts jumping around. Or the battle with this massive robot, you're supposed to hit its bombs back at it and break its legs using a bird that can extend its nose, but instead of doing this, you can scale the legs of the mech (a big robot) without breaking them, and hit the weak point much faster, and after this, it would normally throw you off of it, but by carefully maneuvering through the air, you can get right back on and hit it again! These, combined with many other reasons, is why I think that it's the best Mario game.
