Accelerated Reader is an online tool that we use to keep track of our reading progress and goals throughout the year.

Do your best and enjoy your reading time over the summer! There is also a spot for you to add a bonus book review if you choose to read more than one book. Remember to bring your book(s) with you wherever your summer takes you—whether you're traveling or hanging out in your backyard! Also, remember that summer reading is not meant to be jammed in at the last minute or looked at as a chore. Read your book a little bit each day and you will be amazed at the progress you make! You will not feel stressed about finishing it before the school year begins if you spread your reading time throughout the summer. Summer reading helps to improve your reading skills, comprehension, memory, vocabulary, self-esteem, and so much more!

Directions: Write a solid paragraph of 5-7 sentences for each journal entry. Attach additional paper if necessary. Your entries should be written in your neatest handwriting (cursive or printing).

Journal Entry 1: Describe the main character of the book you are reading. Provide their two main character traits, and use details from the story to support how they show these traits. (Think about their words, actions, thoughts, etc)

Journal Entry 2: Describe the setting of the book you are reading (where and when the story takes place). How does it affect the story, such as the way the characters live and the events in the book? Would you want to live there? Why or why not?

Journal Entry 3: What was the most interesting or exciting part of the book? Describe it in vivid detail and explain why it was interesting or exciting to you.

Journal Entry 4: What is the main problem, or conflict, of the book? How is it resolved by the end of the story? Would you have handled the problem differently if you were the main character?

Journal Entry 5: What is the main message or lesson of the story? Think about what the main character learns or how they change. Do you think the message is important? Why or why not?

Journal Entry 6: Write a detailed and well-developed book review describing and explaining what you liked or didn't like about the book. Provide specific details from the story in your review. Would you recommend this book to others? Why or why not?

Journal Entry 7: Look through the book for five words that stand out to you. These can be words you learned from reading the book, or words that you thought were important. Write down each word, the sentence from the book that contains the word, and then a dictionary definition of the word.

THE FOLLOWING JOURNAL ENTRY IS FOR BONUS CREDIT:

Journal Entry 8: If you read another book, you can write a book review here following the same directions as journal entry 6. Since this entry is for bonus credit, it is optional. If you are choosing not to complete this journal entry, simply leave it blank.
